Origin and History of the Small Christian Communities Global Collaborative Website (2004 to 2021)

Turning over the "Small Christian Communities Global Collaborative Website" to the <u>AMECEA</u>¹ Pastoral Department in Nairobi, Kenya on 1 January, 2021 challenged us to dig deeper to trace the origin and history of our website.

The plan for the "Small Christian Communities Global Collaborative Website" was hatched during the National Small Christian Communities (SCCs) Convocation in San Antonio, Texas, USA in August, 2002.² A very good explanation of the early history is found in Barbara Darling, "Small Christian Communities in North America Collaborative Website" (pages 182-184) in Joseph Healey, Chapter 26, "Promoting SCCs Via the Internet," in Joseph Healey and Jeanne Hinton (eds.), *Small Christian Communities Today: Capturing the New Moment*, Maryknoll, NY: Orbis Books, 2005 (Second Printing 2006, New Cover 2014); Nairobi: Paulines Publications Africa, 2006 (1st Reprint 2011, 2nd Reprint 2012, 3rd Reprint 2017); and Bangalore: Claretian Publications, 2006.

Darling writes:

Thirteen U.S. and Canadian organizations [connected to SCCs] are exploring creative answers by looking at ways they can collaborate in their service to SCCs. Six hundred members and representatives of these organizations convened in San Antonio, Texas, USA in August, 2002. At that gathering and at a subsequent summit of leadership in 2003, it became apparent that a more collaborative model of North American SCCs support and networking was crucial. The decision was made not only for financial reasons, but because this mutuality of purpose and effort reflects the model of Small Church Community among the groups. Yet this metamorphosis of SCCs support in North America is intentionally

a slow process. Particular emphases among the groups such as evangelization, resource development, the connections between SCCs and the catechumenate, leadership training, multicultural church, scriptural literacy, young adults and the diversity of parish-based and community-based small church must be recognized, included, and respected by the whole.

The first concrete result of this loose confederation [of organizations connected to SCCs] is a website that displays links to individual websites of the organizations. Web surfers in North America will find a multitude of services available to SCCs and can easily choose those that fit their current needs. Those outside North America will likely find resources and wisdom to complement their small church experiences as well. Strategies are being developed to work collaboratively in other areas so that there is little overlap of services, yet no needs go unmet in North American SCCs.

The website officially began as the "Small Christian Communities in North America Collaborative Website" by RENEW International in its office in Plainfield, New Jersey, USA in 2004 under the coordination of Michael Brough, the Director of RENEW International with the domain name www.smallchristiancommunities.org. The website was funded by RENEW International and the Copyright was by RENEW International in 2004. The website was designed by Jennifer Lyden who worked with Barb Darling.³ It was set up on a voluntary basis.

Barb Darling agreed to be the first part time volunteer moderator. Her role was coordinator/networker/channel of information rather than providing original content (writing articles, posting new material, etc.) The growth of the website was slow. Some national SCC leaders did not have a clear vision of our digital and internet future. The different national organizations failed to agree on a common or joint "Online SCCs Calendar." Yet a new section called "What's New in SCC Resources" was added in 2005.

The report of the 2007 National Joint Convocation of SCCs in St. Paul, Minnesota, USA from 9-12 August, 2007 and the Follow-Up Conference at the Benedictine Center, Maplewood, Minnesota, USA from 27-29 November, 2007 stated:

Given the presence of participants from 11 other countries throughout the world, there also emerged a desire for continuing networking with each other and with efforts here in the United States. A very concrete follow up was immediately pursued. Following the 2002 National Joint Convocation on Small Christian Communities in San Antonio, a collaborative website was established with the address www.smallchristiancommunities.org. Unfortunately, beyond that initial effort of bringing together information about, and links to, the various organizations and venues with an interest in Small Christian Communities, there was no extended

follow up. On the initiative of Father Joseph Healey, MM, a member of the international network that emerged at the convocation, this website, now under new management, has been re-configured as the Small Christian Communities Global Collaborative Website. It is now organized by continent and is beginning to offer a range of very interesting materials from various parts of the world.

An international volunteer team was formed for website development and maintenance including Charles Gikera,⁴ Joseph Healey, Caroline Adams, Jennifer Ehrentraut, Xavier Thelakkatt and Belza Ramos.

The website was officially handed over from Terry Rickard, the Director of RENEW International, to Joseph Healey, the present Moderator of the website in 2007. A Conference Call in September, 2007 with Deirdre Malacrea, Web Minister of RENEW International and Chuck Bary of Veraciti Hosting Service resulted in the transfer to the new hosting system CNET Global Inc. based in Canada. The transfer of the files, the domain name and copyright was complicated. First from RENEW International in Plainfield, New Jersey, USA to the Healey Development Office in Morristown, New Jersey, USA. Then from the Morristown office to our new webmaster Nicholas Adongo in the Urban Ministries Serving God (UMSG) Office (under Mike Kofski) and the Society for the International Ministries (SIM) Office (under John Shane) in Nairobi, Kenya.

From a continental website it became an international website. Different continental pages were created. At that time our new webmasters in Nairobi, Kenya -- Nicholas Adongo assisted by Charles Gikera - set up an independent website with a new name -- the "Small Christian Communities Global Collaborative Website."

"Global" means it is international and worldwide.

"Collaborative" means that a wide variety and rich diversity of people share and work together to promote this SCC Model of Church:

Men and women.

Old and young.

Different religious denominations including Anglican, Catholic, Mennonite, Pentecostal, and Southern Baptist.

People from different places in the world. This is seen in the "Welcome Message":

Welcome! (English) Bienvenue! (French) Bienvenido! (Spanish) Willko mmen! (German) Karibuni! (Swahili) Namaste! (Hindi) Hwan-yõng-ham-nida! (Korean) Kia Ora! (Maori) Our eight language "Welcome" represents a variety of languages commonly spoken on each of the six continents. With a vision to establish a global collaborative networking website for Small Christian

Communities (SCCs) worldwide, we share SCCs contact information, events, materials, and news from each of the six continents (Africa, Asia, Europe, Latin America, North America and Oceania).

SCCs specialists and grassroots SCCs members.

Different languages, countries and cultures.

Our SCCs collaboration also expresses how SCCs are "a new way of being church" and a "new pastoral model of church." The operation of the website is done in a collaborative, joint responsibility, teamwork, synodal way.

Many of these ideas were presented in "Small Christian Communities Global Collaborative Website" –a PowerPoint Presentation by Caroline Adams, Joe Healey, Bob Pelton, Belza Ramos and Xavier Thelakkatt at the National Alliance of Parishes Restructuring into Communities (NAPRC) Conference in Erie, Pennsylvania, USA on 25 July, 2009. It was proposed to have an "International Section or Page" for international stories. This later became the website page "SCC Stories Databases."

Over the years many people have helped. We have the worldwide proverb *Many hands make light work*. There is a Uganda proverb *One hand washes the other*. The names and responsibilities have changed, evolved, been added to. Presently in February, 2021 the website states: "For more specific concerns, please contact one or more of the following people who are jointly responsible for the SCCs Global Collaborative Website:

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From 2007 to 2020 the host was CNETGlobal Inc. directed by Sam Wanyoike.⁵ Charles Gikera joined Nicholas Adongo in the internet responsibilities and tasks. Charles took over completely as webmaster after Nicholas went to the USA to focus on graduate studies. Presently the webmaster is Bernard Mberere assisted by Charles Gikera and Peter Kyalo. The present Host is HostGator (Texas, USA). The website started in the Joomla Content Management System and transitioned to WordPress. Our sister website is the African Proverbs, Sayings and Stories Website at https://afriprov.org.

The Small Christian Communities Global Collaborative Website is a "work in progress". We make changes and add material regularly. Our Main Menu contains: Home and then, alphabetically: Archives, Book Reviews, Contact Us, Ebooks, Links, Online SCCs, Photo Gallery, SCC Poll Archives, SCC Poll, SCCs Resources, SCC Stories Databases, Videos and Presentations on SCCs and Vision.

Our "Front Page" has a colored map of the world and features on "What's New" and "Calendar of Events." A popular feature is the SCC Polls on the question "The best part of my

Small Christian Community is... "We encourage people to vote often.⁶ There is a link to our interactive <u>Small Christian Community Facebook Page</u>.⁷ We have a feature on Online SCCs. We started the St. Isidore of Seville International Online Skype SCC in 2012 to reflect on the gospel of the following Sunday and connect it to our daily life.

Here are the oldest articles on our website:

- 1. Under "United States of America" under "North America:" Article on SCCs in *National Catholic Reporter*, 28 September 2007.
- 2. Under "Kenya" under "Africa:" Article on a SCCs Workshop in Nairobi, Kenya on 21-22 February, 2008.
- 3. Under "African Continent" under "Africa:" Article on SCCs in Africa from a SCCs Course at Tangaza University College in March, 2008.

Over the years there have been some articles in Spanish, French and Swahili, but more are needed.

Presently the countries with the most online articles are:

We have studied carefully the contemporary signs of the times such as the Covid-19 pandemic and pastoral changes in our parishes. So far we have identified 1437 important characteristics or features of SCCs around the world mainly provided by Small Christian Communities (SCCs) members themselves: 740 on the dynamics/process/principles/classifications of SCCs and 697 on the activities/content of SCCs. We choose six characteristics

Since our overall priority in the AMECEA Region is the on-going formation and training of Small Christian Community (SCC) leaders and members in Eastern Africa, the Ebook contains 27 basic printed SCCs E-Resource materials that are available free online on the SCCs Website.

We are updating our "Links Page" by updating the original 13 links in the Darling article and add new ones. The page on "Videos and Presentations on SCCs" is growing. From our research the emphasis on SCCs Twinning is lessening.

An interesting lens into the history of our website is the Archives Page. Presently there are 78 entries dating from 5 April, 2008 to the beginning of 2021.

As I review our 17 year history of the website (2004 to 2021), I am struck by how many times we have bounced back from, and overcome, multiple technical failures, internet crashes, digital errors, security issues, difficulties in international communications, hacking, computer hardware challenges, lack of good internet connectivity, financial challenges, sickness and personal issues, challenges of handing over to new personnel, the Covid-19 pandemic and other changes/problems/obstacles.⁸ As this international history also shows, changes in personnel and leadership amongst managers and contributors have sometimes slowed down the management,
